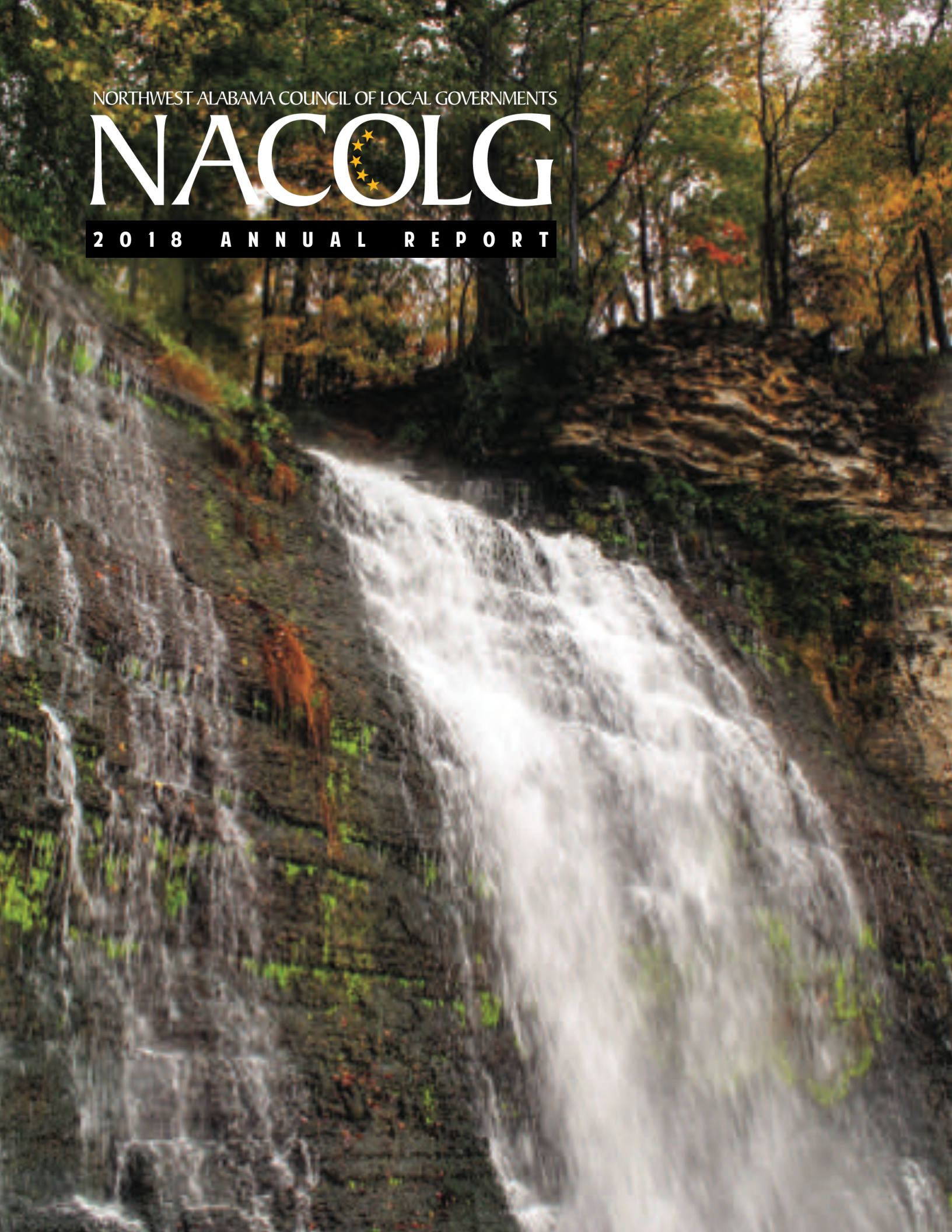

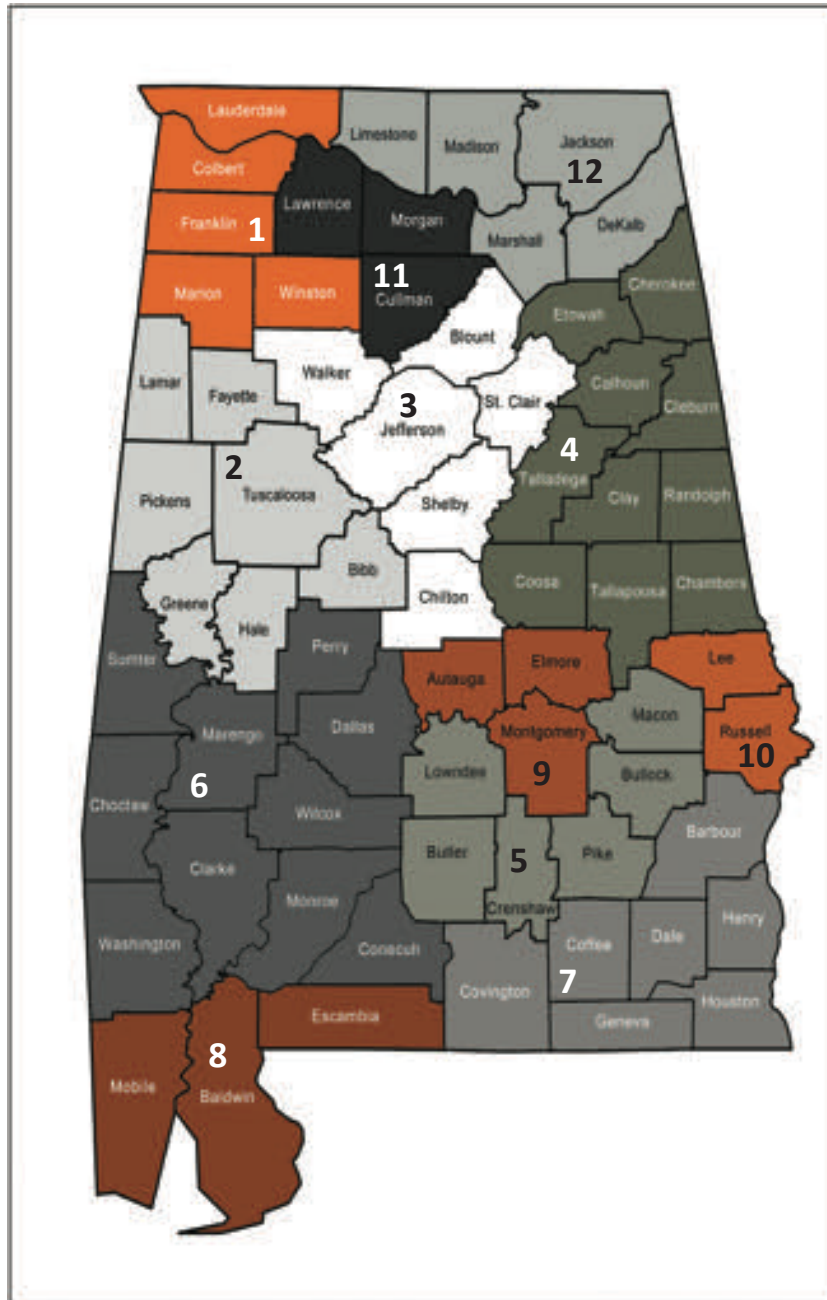

# ORGANIZATIONAL CHART



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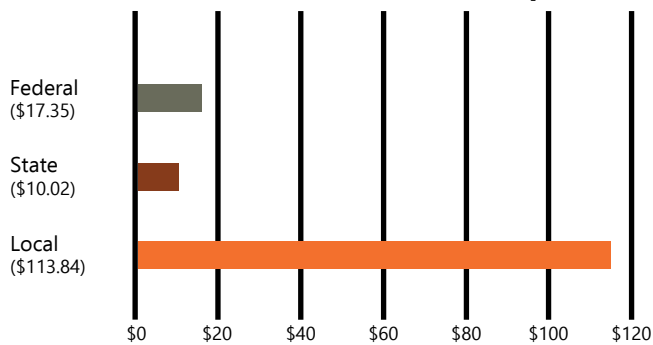

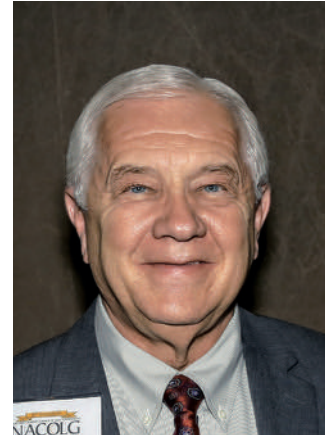

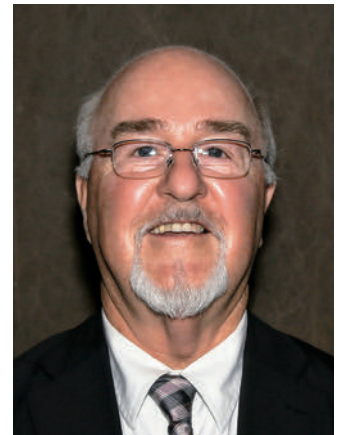

## Department of Governmental Services

The Governmental Services Department assists member governments in developing community and economic development projects, bringing essential services and jobs to the Northwest Alabama region. How does the department accomplish its goal? By carefully listening to local officials and matching all available resources to the required community or economic development need.

To meet the needs of our member governments, the Governmental Services staff works closely with many different agencies and funding sources including: the Alabama Department of Economic and Community Affairs (ADECA), Appalachian Regional Commission (ARC), Economic Development Administration (EDA), USDA Rural Development, the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), Community Development Block Grant Program (CDBG), Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), Alabama Department of Environmental Management (ADEM), Alabama Historical Commission (AHC), and various other agencies.

The department focuses on a variety of community needs including, but not limited to, water, sewer, streets, drainage facilities, demolition, housing rehabilitation, recreation, safe rooms, fire protection, and community/senior centers. Municipalities address many of their needs through competitive grant applications submitted to ADECA, utilizing the CDBG program. ADECA/HUD establishes the yearly CDBG application deadline after a public hearing and comment period. We assist member governments in all aspects of the project from planning and development through construction and close-out.

ADECA accepts CDBG Economic Development applications throughout the year and requires a company's commitment to create or retain jobs. The Governmental Services staff assists with the preparation of CDBG-ED applications and project administration, working with both the local government and the business or industry to benefit from the needed infrastructure improvements and/or financing.



As a Local Development District (LDD) in partnership with the Appalachian Region Commission, NACOLG provides technical assistance and aids in preparing ARC grant applications throughout our region. Eight LDDs exist in Alabama's Appalachian Region, and each LDD operates under a Board of Directors composed of elected representatives from various local governments. The ARC program strives to create opportunities for self-sustaining economic development and improved quality of life.

Designated as an Economic Development District (EDD), NACOLG partners with the Economic Development Administration in the preparation of applications. As the only federal government agency focused exclusively on economic development, the U.S. Department of Commerce's Economic Development Administration plays a critical role in fostering regional economic development efforts in communities across the nation. Through strategic investments which foster job creation and attract private investment, EDA supports development in economically distressed areas of the United States. Believing communities must be empowered to develop and implement their own economic development and revitalization strategies, EDA works directly with local economic development officials to make grant investments which are well-defined, timely, and linked to a long-term, sustainable economic development strategy.

The Governmental Services Department also administers the Revolving Loan Fund program (RLF), an important economic development tool consisting of locally controlled capital used to finance new or expanding businesses to create or retain jobs. The program assists small to medium sized businesses, small manufacturing companies, and our local municipalities. A committee of local bankers and community leaders reviews the loans, giving them personal insight into how the loan proposals will affect the communities within our five-county region.

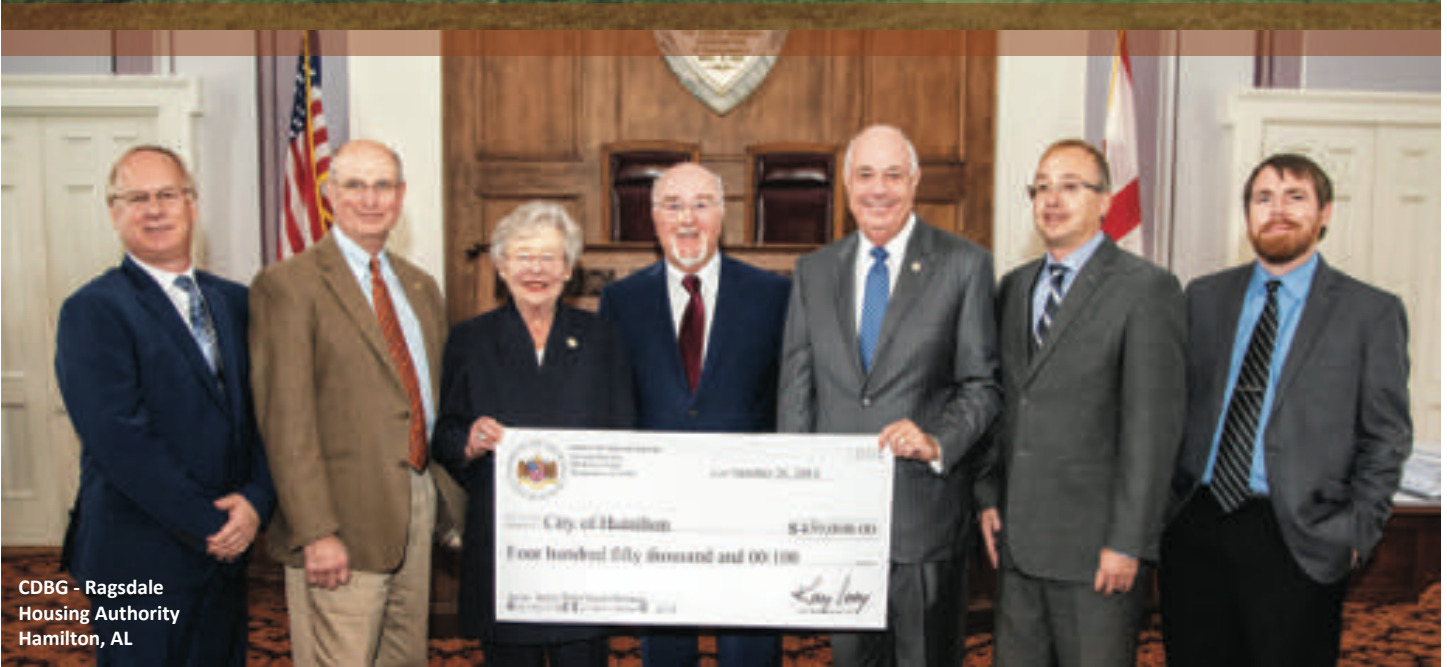

# Department of Planning & Transportation

The Northwest Alabama Council of Local Government’s Department of Planning and Transportation has primary responsibility for assisting local governments and regional partners across northwest Alabama to develop strategies to positively impact long-term conditions in the region. The Planning and Transportation staff provides professional planning and community development services that engage local leaders, members of the public, and critical development partners throughout the process of planning and prioritizing action and investment in the region’s future. This includes assistance with transportation plans, economic development, community development, strategic planning, mapping, and project development. The department works closely with leadership across the region to inventory strengths and assets, identify goals and objectives, and improve community capacity to meet long term goals and objectives.

The Planning and Transportation Department provides services in four major program areas. The Regional and Community Planning program provides strategic and long-range planning to local governments and regional partners to identify potential solutions to a variety of conditions. The Transportation Planning program operates the Rural Planning Organization and the Metropolitan Planning Organization, assisting local governments to accomplish transportation goals and helping to improve access to transportation resources. The Geographic Information Systems program provides assistance to member governments and supports NACOLG programs through technical assistance and mapping. Finally, the Department operates NACOLG Transit, a public transportation system that offers contract service and demand response service to help close gaps in transportation access and mobility for individuals with transportation needs across the region.

This year, NACOLG’s Planning and Transportation staff have worked to form relationships with newly elected officials and to expand success of ongoing efforts. The Regional and Community Planning program completed numerous plans and studies, provided technical assistance to local governments and regional partners, and also completed the Northwest Alabama Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy, 2018-2022 to guide the next five years’ of effort toward regional economic development in northwest Alabama.

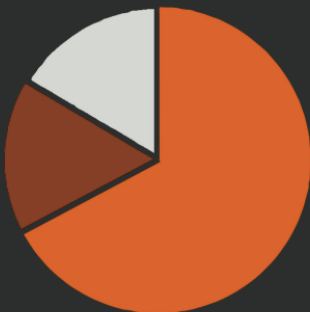

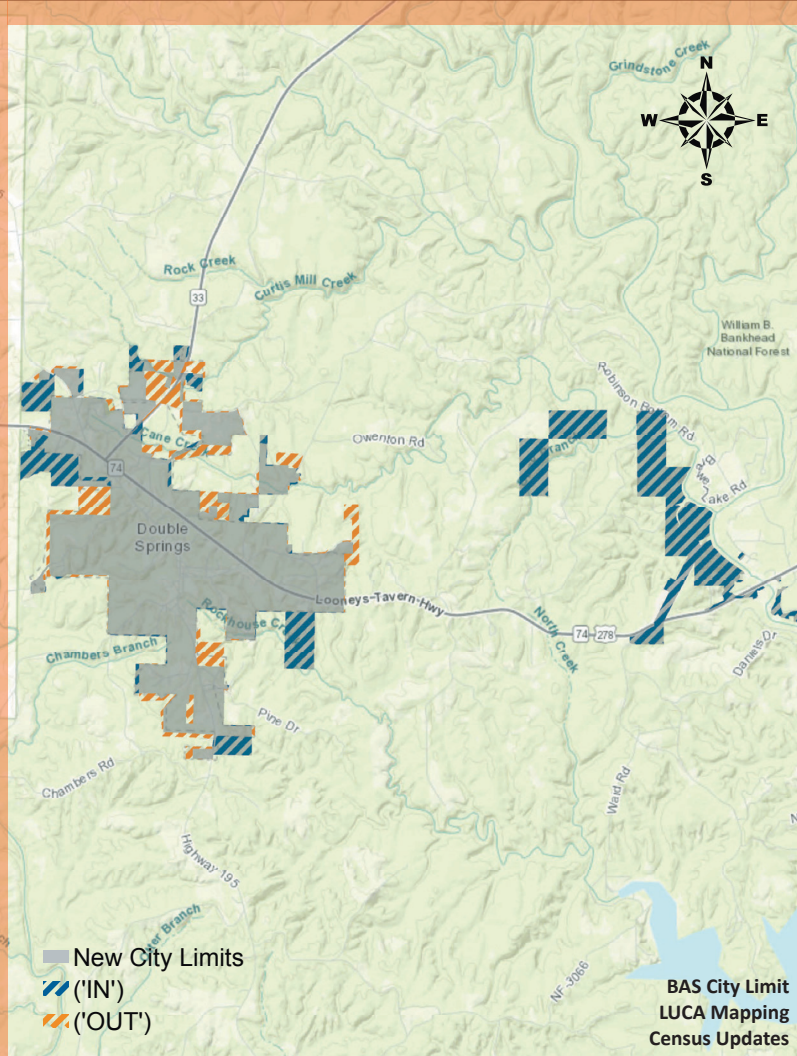

## Department of Aging Services

The NACOLG Department of Aging Services was established in 1974 to serve the over 60 population of Colbert, Franklin, Lauderdale, Marion & Winston Counties. Federal, State and local resources have enabled the Department of Aging Services to provide coordination of a wide array of services throughout Northwest Alabama. The Department is a designated Area Agency on Aging by the State of Alabama's Department of Senior Services which operates and administers the provisions of the Older Americans act of 1965. As advocates for the aging population, it is our desire and mission to promote independence and dignity for those we serve through a comprehensive and coordinated system of quality services.

**Aging and Disability Resource Center** This initiative is to provide a coordinated system of information and access through a single point of entry to all publicly funded long-term supports, including those funded by Medicaid, the Older Americans Act, and other state and federal programs and services.

**Elderly Nutrition Program** The NACOLG/Department of Aging Services operates 24 Senior Centers throughout the five-county region of Colbert, Franklin, Lauderdale, Marion, and Winston Counties along with the municipalities therein. The Elderly Nutrition Program provides seniors with nutritious meals and the opportunity to be active, while building new friendships. A meal delivery program is available for homebound seniors who qualify.

**ALABAMA CARES** is a program designed to support family caregivers by providing training, assistance and resources to help them take care of their aging loved ones and themselves. Caregivers play a vital role in helping seniors maintain their health and independence. Alabama Cares Program offers support for caregivers across the state.

**The Medicaid Waiver Program** is an alternative for nursing home placement for individuals who meet both the financial and medical criteria. The program offers in-home services such as case management, homemaker, personal care, skilled & unskilled respite care and frozen home-delivered meals. For qualifying individuals, Medicaid Waiver can assist nursing home residents who wish to transition back to community living. There is also an option for approved participants to select their own caregiver through the Personal Choices program. Medicaid Waiver allows eligible clients to remain living independently in their homes by providing needed assistance.

**The Ombudsman Program** investigates and works to resolve problems or complaints affecting long-term care residents; Identifies problem areas in long-term care and advocates for change; Provides information about long-term care and related services; Ensures that residents are receiving the legal, financial, social, rehabilitative, and other services to which they are entitled.

**The Senior Employment Program** provides part-time employment for eligible older persons with limited income. In order to be eligible to work as a Senior Worker, a person must be age 55 or older with limited financial means as well as being competent both mentally and physically for work or community service activities.

**The SenioRx Program** is designed for Alabamians who are age 55 and older and for persons with disabilities, who are diagnosed with chronic medical conditions requiring daily medication. The program aims to help people manage their chronic illnesses earlier and prevent more serious health problems later in life. This medication assistance allows individuals to utilize their limited income for food and other important expenses.

**SHIP (Alabama's State Health Insurance Assistance Program)** provides education, counseling and information concerning: Medicare; Medicare Supplement; Medicare Savings Programs; Medicaid; Prescription Drugs; Plan Comparisons Billing & Claims; Rights & Protections and Long-Term Care.

**SMP Program** is designed to assist seniors in identifying and reporting suspected Medicare and Medicaid waste, fraud and abuse. Specifically, seniors will learn to recognize incorrect or improper billings, as well as fraudulent or inflated claims.

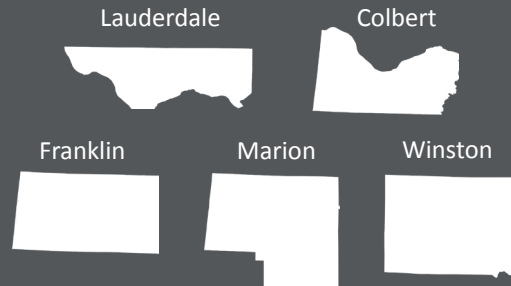
